
















Meet your Rural Teams!











Rural Spotlight: Rural Local Engagement

This is only a snapshot of what the teams have been up to - we hope you have managed to spot us on foot patrol in various areas!


































"I have just celebrated my 20 years in service with Devon and Cornwall Police as a PCSO in Honiton and East Devon. On 6th January, 2003, ten PCSOs started as part of a pilot scheme being run in East Devon; the first to be employed in Devon and Cornwall. We also had ten PCSOs start in Truro, Cornwall, meaning there were only 20 of us recruits.

I moved to East Devon in the early 80s and went to primary school in Offwell before moving into Honiton, where I went to the Community College. I have lived and worked in Honiton since I was in my mid-teens. I worked as a baker before starting my job as a PCSO. My brother-in-law worked as a Sergeant within D&C Police at the time, and after reading an article and getting some advice from him, I applied for the PCSO role.

I have met many people throughout my time in the police force, and still continue to enjoy being able to support our community."








































