

MONTHLY FOCUS:

LIVESTOCK THEFT


What is livestock theft?

Livestock theft affects every part of the UK. Unfortunately across the nation, sheep theft/rustling is on the rise with farm animals worth £3 million stolen in the UK during 2019 (NFU Mutual). It is one of the costliest crimes affecting Britain's farmers, after vehicle and machinery theft. It carries a heavy emotional impact on farmers as animals are often the product of many years of careful breeding and care. Single animals can be worth many thousands of pounds, depending on type and breed.

For the purpose of livestock theft, livestock is regarded as any creature kept for the production of food, wool, skins or fur for the purpose of its use in the farming of land or the carrying on of any agricultural activity.

What are some ways that I can help to reduce livestock theft?

- Ensure your farm is easy to locate by attending officers you can use the app 'what3words' or a grid reference and road name
- Regularly check all gates and fences to prevent accidentals straying check your stock regularly and at varying times
- Consider the use of signage to deter offenders, such as 'CCTV in operation due to sheep theft'
- Take photographs of valuable individual animals or where there is something unusual about their appearance such as being a rare breed or having a particular marking. These photographs can then be used to raise awareness of any subsequent theft
- Ensure all animals are tagged and individually marked with paint, ear notches etc. Ensure lost tags are replaced promptly
- Always maintain accurate records of all stock and movements
- Maintain regular contact with neighbouring landowners and ask them to familiarise themselves with your stock marks and ask them to alert you if stock are out of place and to report any suspicious vehicles or people in the area



MONTHLY FOCUS:

LIVESTOCK THEFT

- Where possible, utilise locks to secure all gates, and invert hinges to prevent removal
- Consider reporting your theft to the National Sheep Association, who can raise the profile and awareness of the theft nationally
- Join Farm Watch and other local social media/community groups to keep in touch with what is going on
- Join the Farm No Cold Caller Scheme
- Explore potential for technical solutions to prevent and detect livestock theft, including gate monitors linked to a mobile phone, cameras - both covert and overt - that cover access/egress points, and GPS tagging opportunities or property marking microdot markers into the fleeces of animals
- Where possible, block/obstruct vehicular access to location
- Keep pedigree stock/valuable animals closer to home and graze away from roads where practical to do so
- Consider alternative arrangements for any stock roaming too far away from their grazing area on common land
