

For questions, advice and to receive updates on crimes that have already been reported, contact us using the **webchat** function on the Devon & Cornwall Police homepage to have a conversation with a staff member at our contact centre. This service is available 24 hours a day, 7 days a week



For non-emergencies, give us a call on 101. Contact Officers are there to answer your calls 24 hours a day, 7 days a week. Please be kind and respectful to our staff; rest assured we will answer your call as soon as we are able. There are often high volumes of incoming calls, so depending on the urgency of your enquiry with us, it may be worth considering some of the other contact options available, especially if you do have access to the internet, to allow the phone lines to be more accessible to those without internet access.

Who should I contact?



If you are calling us about a non-police matter, you might be stopping someone we can help getting through.

Always check our website to make sure you are contacting the right people first time: **dc.police.uk/who-to-contact**

- Abandoned cars, untaxed cars, and anti-social parking are dealt with by local councils - please do not report this to the police unless the vehicle has been left where it presents a danger to you or to other members of the public
- Untaxed cars need to be reported to the DVLA
- Lost or found dogs should be reported to your local dog warden
- Noisy neighbours need to be reported to the council environmental health team
- After swapping insurance details, if no one is injured, there is no need to report a road traffic collision


SEATON CARNIVAL




SHED & OUTBUILDING CRIME PREVENTION



Shed and outbuilding security can be improved using a few simple measures.

- Don't make a burglar's job easier by leaving gardening tools lying around these are often used to force entry into your home, shed, or outbuilding
- Security mark your tools and equipment using a SecuredByDesign-recognised forensic asset markings or etching kits to deter thieves and reduce theft
- Use SecuredByDesign-approved hasps and staples fitted one-third up and one-third down the door, coach bolted through the shed structure or secured with either security or non-return screws (which can only be unscrewed using a special tool)
- If you have battery-operated garden tools, store the batteries and chargers in the house away from the tools to make them less attractive to steal and less valuable to sell on
- Shed windows can be fitted with weld mesh or grilles on the inside if you don't use the window, consider screwing it shut. Also consider replacing glass panes with perspex or polycarbonate to as more secure alternatives.
- Keep items out of sight, such as by using netting or permanent spray-on glass frosting
- Consider getting a battery-operated shed alarm that responds to movement or door contact with an extremely loud siren (please keep this out of the reach of young children)
- Do not leave ladders outside but, if you have no alternative, chain them up
- Check that you have adequate cover under your household insurance for theft from your garden and outbuildings

HORSEBOX & TRAILER CRIME PREVENTION



Thefts of lightweight livestock and flatbed trailers and horseboxes has been growing. They are particularly vulnerable as they can be easily towed away unless appropriate security measures are taken. Below are some precautions you can take. Please remember that a layered approach to security is best, aiming to make your property a less-attractive target to thieves.

- **PHYSICAL SECURITY** try to make your trailer or horsebox unattractive to steal. If the thief must spend more time trying to break security products attached to the trailer, they may move onto an easier target. Consider fitting a combination of several products, such as a hitch lock anti-theft device, wheel clamps and locking wheel nuts. If your trailer is stored in a barn or on a hard concrete surface, SecuredByDesign-approved ground anchors with a heavy duty chain attached with a high attack rating is another option to consider.
- **RESTRICT ACCESS** if your trailer or horsebox is parked on a driveway, consider closing any gates at night or when not in use. Vehicle bollards can provide an extra visible deterrent.
- **RECORD DETAILS** keep a record of serial numbers, chassis and model numbers and take note of any custom marks on the horsebox or trailer. Take colour photographs from several angles, and take videos with a smartphone if possible to include any markings. If stolen, being able to track and identify your horsebox or trailer is vital to the police.
- **SECURITY MARKING** security marking your trailer or horsebox using a SecuredByDesign-recognised forensic asset marker is a highly effective and visible deterrent to thieves.
- **THE CESAR SYSTEM** is the National security marking system of the Construction Equipment Association and Agricultural Engineers Association, and has the aim of reducing plant and farm theft.
- **TRACKING SYSTEMS** fit a SecuredByDesign-approved tracking device to the horsebox so that it can be traced if stolen.
- **TACK** do not leave any tack in the horsebox overnight store it away safely and be especially careful at events and shows.
- **INSURANCE** check that you have adequate cover under your insurance for theft of your tack, including overnight shows away from home.
